
While summer wanes, the warm weather continues. May the fall bring additional moisture and good conditions for the farmers, good lessons for the students, and good experiences for our Brothers.





Alumni Summer Meeting



To finish the evening, a special alumnus from Wichita, John Niemann, opened his family farm and barn to the AZ guests for a pleasant evening of socializing and food, along with a few firecracker crackles over his private pond. All told, the day was successful and a step in the right direction to help improve the chapter that has been a large part of many lives over the years and an important career and life stepping stone.

Summer Highlights—Jobs, Internships, & Travel



The summers have been eventful and exciting for many of our Brothers. From internships to summer jobs, they are always on the move. Here are just a few highlights:

Anthony Becker, Junior, in Feed Science, was busy this summer. Anthony was a sales intern for Hutchins-Mayrath in Clay Center, Kansas. He spent many hours making and taking phone calls, designing feed bins, and creating custom quotes for potential clients. In addition to his internship, Becker also worked during the weekends for a local dairy in Palmer, Kansas called Meier Family Dairy. On average, they milk 550 Holsteins and 50 Jerseys, and their facility is one of the most advanced in the United States. It was also the first robotic dairy in the state of Kansas with the installation of 12 Lely A4 Astronaut milking robots in 2015. Pictured at left are just a few different views of this operation and their new robotic technology, including this automatic feed new robotic sweeper.



Another Brother that has had a busy summer is Dean Klahr, senior, in Animal Science. Traveling a little further from Manhattan and Kansas, he was located in the Dallas-Fort Worth, Texas area working for a pet food company, Hills Pet Nutrition, as their sales intern. Over the summer, Dean was responsible for over 35 separate customer accounts, thus making numerous clinic visits, pushing promotions and especially new prescription diets. One such formulation is called "Metabolic."



"It motivates and speeds up the natural metabolism of a dog or cat, allowing it to lose weight and fight obesity regardless of how much food it consumes," Klahr said.

Dean typically spent about 4 hours each day in the car driving to different clinics and animal hospitals around the Dallas-Fort Worth area.


